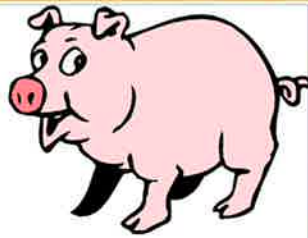

My name is Seth Huhta. I am Paiute. I am 15 years old and this was my 8th year in 4-H. The Bishop Tribe and Paiute Palace

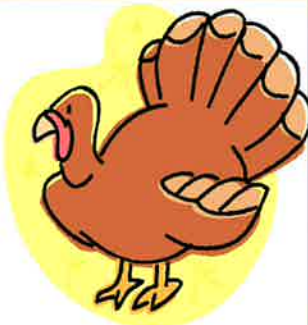

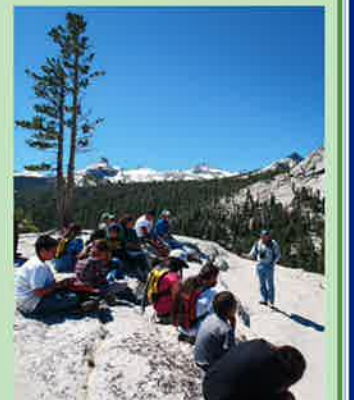
On our second day we met a living legend, Mrs. Julia Parker, a renowned National Park Ranger in Yosemite Valley. She shared her life story with us, told us a Native American creation story and she taught us about plants native to the Yosemite area used by the Miwok for baskets and tools. Mrs. Parker also invited us in the Round House where she sang a Miwok song and drummed on a hollowed tree trunk before sending us off with a prayer. To our surprise, we noticed California Governor Jerry Brown touring the Indian Village at the same time we were. He was gracious enough to let us snap a group photo with him! We were also fortunate to learn how to weave a tule basket from Mrs. Parker's daughter, Lucy. She shared her experience learning how to collect and prepare plant materials during the appropriate seasons and her ongoing training, that began when she was a young girl, to become a basket weaver. While we were in Yosemite Valley we walked to the base of Yosemite Falls and saw beautiful flowers, deer, squirrels and even a young bear. It was an amazing day for all of us!

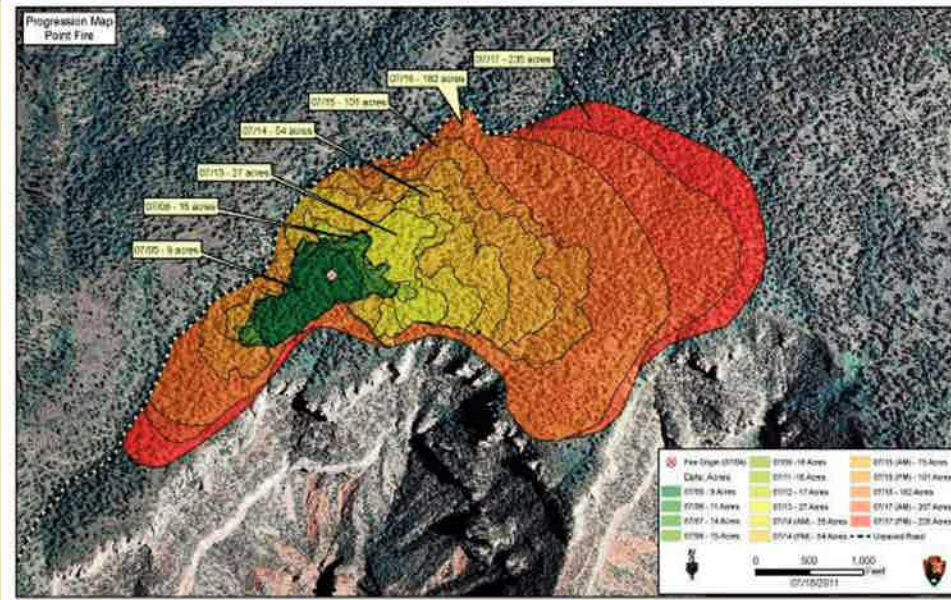

The Lyon Fire Impacting Visibility, but Is it Affecting Air Quality?

Since July 8th the Lyon Fire has been burning on the Sequoia National Forest, just South and West of Bishop. As of July 21st, the fire had expanded to cover 5,390 acres, and a map of the fire progression is shown below.

The fire has impacted visibility on the Bishop Paiute Reservation, as was apparent from the Tribal Air Program's web camera images.

We have selected the image from July 20th at 3:00PM Pacific Standard Time (4:00PM Daylight Savings time) because



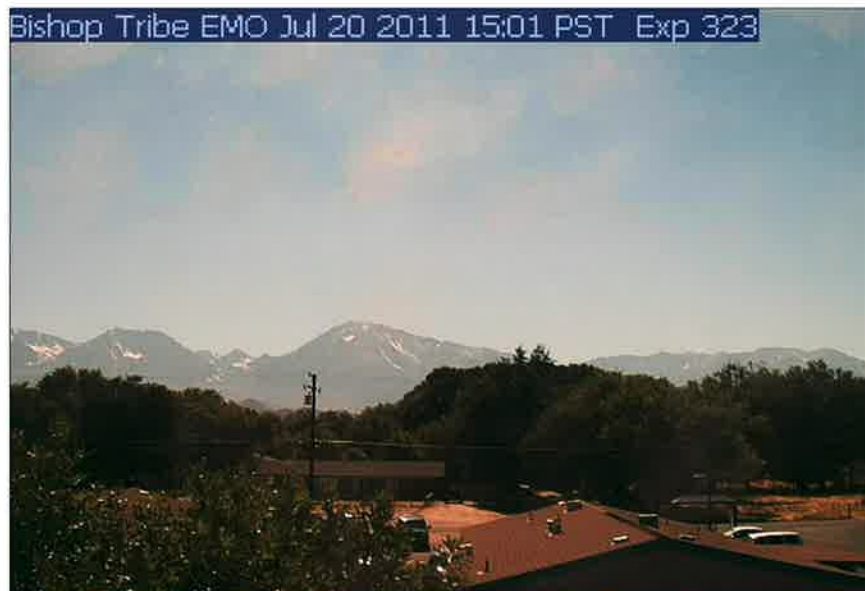
it represents some of the worst visibility and some of the worst air quality as measured by particulate matter less than 2.5 microns in diameter (PM-2.5).

Despite the poor visibility, the air quality could not be considered to be dangerous to the health of Reservation residents. The maximum level of PM-2.5 on July 20th was only 15.64 micrograms per cubic meter of air.

The range for "good air quality" according to the EPA's Air Quality Index, is between 0 and 50 micrograms. Smoke can have a large impact on visibility, without much impact on air quality because some particles disperse light whereas others absorb light. The net effect is reduced visibility.

Dog Control

In the past few months there have been increasing reports of individuals being bitten or chased by loose dogs and dogs chasing livestock. These issues have shed new light on the importance of the Tribe's Dog Control Ordinance No. 2009-02. While the Tribal Council considers the full implementation of the Ordinance, here is the most important issue- "vicious dogs". A "vicious dog" is defined in the Dog Control Ordinance as follows:

4.13 "any dog that displays a menacing temper and ferocity and, when unprovoked, bites a person, causing injury or death". Copies of the Dog Control Ordinance are available at the Tribal Office, 50 Tu Su Lane.

What can you do? If you are a dog owner take steps to ensure your dog is under your control at "all" times. Be respectful of your neighbors and of your Tribal Community. Many tribal members

enjoy walking or running through the reservation but refuse to due to the number of loose dogs on the reservation. Remember, it's the responsibility of all of us, not just one individual, to ensure that our community is safe for everyone.

If you have continuing problems with a dog and you know who the owner is, you have the option of filing a complaint against the owner in Tribal Court. Please see Joyce Alvey, Tribal Court Clerk, for information on how to file a Complaint.

While it's true, Inyo County Animal Control can't handle dog issues on the reservation, that doesn't prohibit dogs from being picked up and being delivered to Inyo County Animal Control off the reservation. Let's work together, as a Tribal Community, to make our reservation a safe and a fun place to enjoy.

Report Criminal Activity

If you see, hear, or become aware of suspicious activity, or know of a crime that is, was or is soon to be committed, on or off the reservation, the Bishop Paiute Tribe's Public Safety Department encourages you to report it. Here's How to Report Crime:

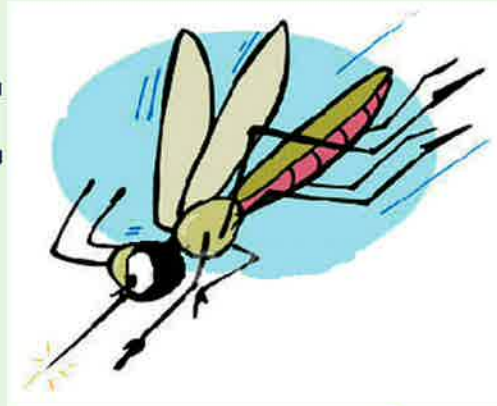

Defensible Space: You Can Do It

- Remove all flammable vegetation around all structures. State law requires a minimum of 100 feet of clearance.
- Trim trees so branches are six feet from the ground and 10 feet from your chimney. Remove branches overhanging your roof.
- Call your utility company for help with trees near power lines. Never trim these yourself.
- Remove any dead trees.
- Cut weeds and dead grasses six inches or shorter.
- Always work early in the morning and make sure your power tools have spark arresters to prevent equipment-caused fires.
- Ask your local nursery about landscaping with beautiful, fire-resistant plants.
- Maintain defensible space by cleaning up plant litter and watering properly.

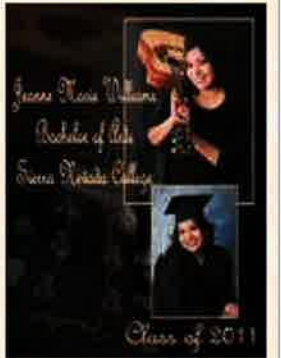
Thank You From Justin Alvey

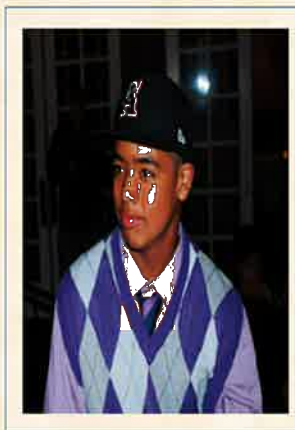

Class taught by the California and Nevada Creeks and Communities Cadres
Sponsored by the Bishop Paiute Tribe Environmental Management Office with funding from an USEPA grant

What is a Riparian area?: The banks of a river, stream, or other body of water as well as the plant and animal communities along such water bodies.

Primary Purpose of PFC: To assess whether riparian-wetland areas are functioning properly, or to what level they are lacking optimum functionality.

Who Should Attend?: Tribal residents living near waterways and/or wetlands, or residents interested in learning about becoming a water steward.

Other Attendants: Interdisciplinary land managers including biologists and specialists in vegetation, soils, and hydrology will also be enrolled.

Benefits: Waterways within the Bishop Paiute Reservation profit from residents being training alongside professional land managers specializing in biological and physical sciences vital to the health and well-being of our waterways and riparian systems. Trained residents can then volunteer their knowledge to assist riparian monitoring and assessment efforts in the future.
