Tropical Storm Hilary

Early preparations proved to be valuable, both from the record-breaking winter snowpack runoff and from Tropical Storm Hilary.

What began as an inquiry for assistance from the US Army Corps of Engineers, in May, to completion of flood mitigation measures in June, eventually helped ensure the Bishop Tribal Community was prepared for the influx of moisture.

While Tropical Storm Hilary heavily impacted the Southern part of Inyo County, making many roads in and out of Death Valley impassable, for the most part Bishop and the Reservation were spared any real significant impacts. A total of 1.92" of rain fell on the Reservation, according to the Bishop Paiute Tribe's Air Program.

The Tribe's Emergency Management Team engaged in several meetings leading up to, and during, the storm. These meetings included the California Office of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service-Las Vegas, Inyo County, LA DWP and Southern California Edison.

The Bishop Paiute Tribe wishes to thank all staff members who prepared in advance and who were ready to act in the event assistance was needed.

Bishop Paiute Tribe Celebrates California's First Tribal SOMAH Funded Solar Installation

The Bishop Paiute Tribe is celebrating a newly installed 49 kW DC system as part of the tribe's overall sustainable energy plan, which seeks to improve energy efficiency for reservation residents through the addition of renewable energy resources. The project was installed in part with funding from the California Solar on Multifamily Affordable Housing (SOMAH) Program at Coyote Mountain Apartments, an affordable housing and sober living facility. A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held August 9.

"We are proud of the efforts of the Bishop Paiute Tribe's Environmental Management Office (EMO) and our EMO Director Brian Adkins for spearheading this endeavor," the Bishop Paiute Tribal Council said in a statement. "The Tribe continuously looks for improvements that benefit our tribal members and the community. This project took a lot of planning and execution, and we hope other Tribal communities can look to us as an inspiration and bring similar projects to their communities. We don't want to take the credit for this amazing achievement. That credit belongs to all of those involved from start to finish, who made this project come to fruition."

The project is the first SOMAH Program incentivized installation to be completed within a tribal reservation in the state. The \$180,666 system is projected to save the 24 households \$473,747 on their energy bills over the lifetime of the system.

California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) Commissioner John Reynolds shared his enthusiasm about the completed project: "I congratulate the Bishop Paiute Tribe and GRID for completing the first tribal solar project under the SOMAH Program. This is exactly the kind of community-based and community-led solar project we need more of, and as the Public Utilities Commission considers ways to improve the SOMAH Program in the future, I hope we hear from tribes and organizations like the ones here today about what we can do to make sure solar reaches everyone."

The project also received praise from Christina Snider, Tribal Affairs Secretary to Governor Gavin Newsom. "California commends the Bishop Paiute Tribe for its leadership in advancing our shared goals of tribal self-determination, clean energy workforce development and equitable access to energy efficient housing on tribal lands through this historic project," she said.

The solar project is a partnership between the Bishop Paiute Tribe Community Development Department and GRID Alternatives' Inland Empire (GRID IE) office. "From our first solar installation with the Bishop Paiute Tribe 10 years ago, to this most recent and historic solar project at Coyote Mountain Apartments, GRID IE is proud of its decade-long partnership of delivering renewable energy solutions and job-training opportunities to tribal residents," said Jamie Alonzo, Executive Director of GRID IE Office. "We look forward to deepening and expanding our energy and job training working partnership with the Bishop Paiute Tribe for decades to come."

The solar installation was completed by Scott Smith, a local contractor, via GRID Alternatives' Sub Contractor Partnership Program. As part of SOMAH's on-the-job training, a tribal member took part in the installation as a paid trainee referred from the local job training organization High Point Solar. The workforce development aspect of the project reflects both a SOMAH Program commitment to local neighborhoods and the tribe's commitment to train 100 tribal members in the skills and trade of renewable energy installation per its 2017 Strategic Energy Plan.

"SOMAH is honored to collaborate with the Bishop Paiute Tribe in our shared mission to empower communities through renewable energy," said SOMAH Program Manager Rachael Diaz. "By bringing over 49 kilowatts of solar to Coyote Mountain Apartments, we aim to provide tangible benefits to the residents, such as energy bill savings, allowing them to allocate more resources towards their families. We look forward to further enhancing our partnership with Tribal communities, including the Bishop Paiute Tribe, in our shared pursuit of building an equitable sustainable future."

GRID Alternatives IE supported the tribe through each milestone of the process from program enrollment to project completion. The project was fully funded through the \$114,457 incentive provided by the SOMAH Program, \$51,086 from a Tribal Solar Accelerator Fund Sempra Foundation grant and over \$15,000 as an in-kind donation from the Bishop Paiute Tribe.



ICWA Needs YOU!

From the data above, it's clear that the Social Services: Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) Program is in desperate need of more Tribally Approved Homes (TAH). Currently the ICWA Program only has 1 TAH and its currently being utilized by a tribal youth.

A TAH is a home that is licensed or approved by the Bishop Paiute Tribe's Social Services: ICWA Program for tribal children who are in the Juvenile Dependency System. In other words, the tribal children who are involved with Child Protective Services can be placed in TAH's while they wait to reunify with their parents. The BPT has independent authority to approve homes using the tribe's own socially and culturally appropriate standards and are not subject to California's Resource Family Approval (RFA) requirements.

TAH Process:

- 1. Stop by the Social Services Department and pick up a TAH application.
- 2. Fill out and return the application to the Social Services Department.
- 3. The ICWA Specialist will then notify the Inyo County RFA to start the background check and live scan.
- 4. Inyo County Resource Family Approval (RFA) department will follow up with the ICWA Specialist
- 5. The ICWA Specialist will then notify the applicant(s) if they have been approved/denied. (There is an appeals process for those who are initially denied).
- 6. Once approved the final step is for the ICWA Specialist to conduct a home assessment.
- 7. Upon approval of the home assessment then they family will be officially a TAH

Family Formation participated in the Back-to-School Backpack Event to assist our youth with backpacks and school supplies before returning to school. This event was in collaboration with OVCDC and TANF and had a booth with Clorox Clean Up Wipes, Tissue Box, and Hand Sanitizer for them to fulfill the youth's lists, they got from their teachers. There were other booths that participated in the event including the Bishop Paiute Tribe, Bishop Indian Education Center, Toiyabe Indian Health Project, Inyo County Probation, Nuumu Yadoha Language Program, Native American Liaisons, and others.

Family Formation would like to give you all a few tips to help getting back to school a little easier:

·Go to sleep early. (8 hours if possible)

·Set out your clothes the night before.

·Pack lunches the night before.

·Set your backpacks ready to go by the door.

·Take showers in the evening before bedtime.

·Do all homework as soon as you get home from school.

•Ensure that everyone is fueling their bodies adequately.

·Stay hydrated. (Drink at least half your weight in ounces each day.)

Each quarter we will be having a workshop to assist the high school students for each seasonal sport and school activity and trip. Self-Help Center

With support from the Judicial Council of California and the Bishop Paiute Tribe's Social Services The Tribal Court Clerk's Office at 430 N. Barlow Program, we are pleased to remind everyone that the "Self-Help Center" is now available at the responding to cases under the Tribal Code Social Services Office on Tu Su Lane. While the Self-Help Center can not give legal advice or represent either party as an advocate or attorney, they can assist Tribal members completing and processing the necessary court forms with respect to restraining/protective orders in the State Court (Invo County Superior Court) and/or the Bishop Paiute Tribal Court. The Self-Help Center will help both parties, those seeking protection and those responding to the request for a restraining/protection order. For more information or to schedule an appointment, please contact the Social Services Department at (760) 873-4414.

Tribal Court Jurisdiction, Forms, Advocates/ Attorneys

Lane has forms to assist individuals in filing or where the Tribal Court has civil jurisdiction. Such cases include, but are not necessarily limited to the following Codes: Dog Control, Fireworks, Adult Guardianship, Name Change and Name Verification, Public Safety (Domestic Violence, Civil Harassment, Elder Abuse), Small Claims, Traffic, Trespass, and the Tribal Mortgage Lending and Unlawful Detainer (Landlord/ Tenant).

For further information or to obtain forms, please contact the Tribal Court Clerk's Office, which also maintains lists of attorneys and advocates admitted to practice before the Tribal Court.

Tribal Youth Healing to Wellness Court & Tribal Youth Attendance Achievement Program

We are also pleased to announce that the "Tribal Youth Juvenile Healing to Wellness Court" and our new "Tribal Court Youth Attendance Achievement Program are now accepting referrals. The Healing to Wellness Court focuses on youth who have a problem with alcohol and/or other drugs, while the Attendance Achievement Program is designed to improve school attendance and academic achievement.

Recognizing that children are the Tribe's most valuable asset in promoting and preserving tribal sovereignty and self-sufficiency, the vision of our programs is to redirect tribal youth with drug/alcohol and/or school truancy issues; promote inclusivity in their

culture and strengthen their connection with the community. In a real sense, culture is connectivity. We want the youth to understand and know in their hearts that they are truly valued members of the community who have unique gifts and developing talents to share. Time with Elders, including volunteer work service, will be a vital component of the program. Through relationships with Elders and mentors we hope the youth will gain wisdom and celebrate their cultural heritage, through a holistic, culturally focused and strength-based program.

Formerly, referrals to the Healing and Wellness Court had to come from Inyo County Probation or the Inyo County Superior (Juvenile) Court. Now however, referrals can be made by parents, guardians, and Indian Custodians. Native youth who are enrolled or eligible for enrollment in any federally recognized tribe, and are living within the Bishop Paiute Tribal Service Area (excluding Mono County and Big Pine) are eligible to participate. Native youth can be referred to either or both programs.

Participants in both programs will have an individualized plan, which would include as needed, services such as individual and group substance use counseling, behavioral health treatment (many youth suffer from unresolved issues around grief and trauma), mentoring, and educational assistance. We hope to incentivize or motivate students to engage in the programs to maintain eligibility for individual and group activities of interest to each of them. Both programs are adopting a new focus with emphasis on being supportive and helping the youth develop a strong Tribal connection

through individual and group participation in traditional cultural activities, or as appropriate other religious/spiritual activities.

Manahuu from the COSA!

The summer flew by and we are already prepping the COSA to be ready for our outdoor education programs Taking Root and Branching Out. As you probably know, both programs are run by Inyo County Office of Education (ICOE) in collaboration with EMO and focus on teaching kids to learn about the natural world through observation and asking questions. Taking Root is for 3rd grade classes and Branching Out is for 5th grade classes.



In order to prepare the COSA for the programs we have been mowing down grass, removing cattail and tule from Pond 3 and removing vegetation from the tower area by Pond 3. The tower area is a historic structure by the pond that is currently surrounded by invasive Trees of Heaven. We will be removing the trees and filling in the foundation with sand to create a place for students to sit and learn. We hope that this space can be an alternative space if (when) any flooding happens in the COSA and makes it hard to access the log circle.



CLINE HOWARD ALL INDIAN VFW POST 4330

The Cline Howard VFW Post 4330, mustered in June 16, 1951, was established by Native American veterans of WWI, WWII, and the Korean War from the Eastern Sierra reservations. This post, at one time, was the longest running all-Indian post in the state of California. Members of the 4330 traveled up and down the state, raised and posted the colors at Native American functions, and performed military services for deceased veterans, to which they proudly carried out.




